
Flee: A 2021 Danish adult animated documentary film directed by Jonas Poher Rasmussen. It follows the story of a man under the alias Amin Nawabi, who shares his hidden past of fleeing his home country of Afghanistan to Denmark for the first time. Riz Ahmed and Nikolaj Coster-Waldau serve as executive producers and narrators for the English-language dub version..



Nomadland: A 2020 American drama film written, produced, edited, and directed by Chloé Zhao. Based on the 2017 nonfiction book Nomadland: Surviving America in the Twenty-First Century by Jessica Bruder, it stars Frances McDormand as a widow who leaves to travel around the United States in her van as a nomad. David Strathairn also stars in a supporting role. Real-life nomads appear as fictionalized versions of themselves, including Linda May, Swankie and Bob Wells.



Short Term 12: A 2013 American independent drama film written and directed by Destin Daniel Cretton, adapted from Cretton's short film of the same name, produced in 2009. The film stars Brie Larson as Grace Howard, a young supervisor of a group home for troubled teenagers. Cretton based Short Term 12 on his own experience working in a group facility for teenagers. He wrote and produced a short film exploring this and later adapted it into a feature-length screenplay.



<u>Unorthodox</u>: A German-American drama television miniseries that debuted on Netflix on March 26, 2020. Primarily in Yiddish, it is inspired by Deborah Feldman's 2012 autobiography, *Unorthodox: The Scandalous Rejection of My Hasidic Roots*. The 4-part miniseries was created and written by Anna Winger and Alexa Karolinski, and directed by Maria Schrader.

Reflection Questions

Don't treat these questions like "homework" or try to answer everyone. Instead, make time to meditate on the list and then pick <u>the one</u> question that speaks to you most. The goal is to figure out which question captures the call of your inner voice? Which one contains "your work"? And what is that question trying to get you to notice or acknowledge?

Often it helps to read the list to a friend or loved one and ask them which question they think is the question you need to wrestle with!

- 1. When was the first time you thought to yourself, "Now I belong."
- 2. How does the assurance of belonging most often enter your body? Through words? Touch? Silence? Song? Solitude? Nature? Creative expression? Prayer? Memory?
- 3. What does the phrase "Belonging to myself" mean to you?
- 4. Whose inability to belong breaks your heart?
- 5. Is living in the future distorting the fact that you are already home?
- 6. What exiled or hidden part of yourself needs invited back into belonging?
- 7. Is it time to let yourself belong to your grief, rather than exiling it?
- 8. What one change in your UU church community would increase your sense of belonging?
- 9. Who reminds you of what real belonging is? Have you ever thanked them for that gift?
- 10. Are you being tempted or pressured to sacrifice your integrity for belonging?
- 11. What are you going to do to end your imposter syndrome, i.e. your secret feeling that you don't really belong, and they will soon find you out?
- 12. What has life taught you about disconnecting your belonging from your belonging s?
- 13. If someone asked you, "How do you belong to the land?", what would you answer?
- 14. Think of the family members and friends that have the deepest sense of belonging. What do they all have in common?
- 15. What's your question? Your question may not be listed above. As always, if the above questions don't include what life is asking from you, spend the month listening to your days to find it.

We Belong to Ourselves: A Meditation for a Post-Roe World

We belong to ourselves.

Oh, yes, of course, we also belong to families, friends, communities of faith, neighborhoods, the transcendent and the earth that holds us.

But for now, in our post-Roe world, for these few moments, let's focus our awareness on belonging to *ourselves*. Let this sink in: *We belong to ourselves*. This is the first belonging, the one that undergirds and grounds all the rest. We decide, in the sovereign mystery of our selfhood: Will we stay or will we go? What shall we do? Whom shall we love? What is best for me? Is life—*my* life—worth the living?
