<p><u>tick, tick...Boom!</u>: A 2021 American biographical musical drama film directed by Lin-Manuel Miranda in his feature directorial debut. Written by Steven Levenson, who also serves as an executive producer, it is based on the stage musical of the same name by Jonathan Larson, a semi-autobiographical story about Larson writing a musical to enter into the theater industry. It was named one of the best films of 2021 by the American Film Institute and was nominated for numerous awards.</p>	
<p><u>Coda</u>: A 2021 coming-of-age comedy-drama film written and directed by Sian Heder. An English-language remake of the 2014 French-Belgian film <i>La Famille Bélier</i>, it stars Emilia Jones as the titular child of deaf adults (CODA) and only hearing member of a deaf family, who attempts to help her family's struggling fishing business, while pursuing her own aspirations of being a singer. It was named one of the top 10 films of 2021 by the American Film Institute and won numerous awards, including Best Picture.</p>	
<p><u>Nope</u>: A 2022 American neo-Western science fiction horror film directed, written, and co-produced by Jordan Peele. It stars Daniel Kaluuya and Keke Palmer as horse-wrangling siblings attempting to capture evidence of an unidentified flying object. It has received praise for its ambition, performances, themes, cinematography, and direction.</p>	
<p><u>Shut Up and Sing</u>: A 2006 American documentary film produced and directed by Barbara Kopple and Cecilia Peck. The film follows the Dixie Chicks, an all-female Texas-based country music trio, over a three-year period of intense public scrutiny, fan backlash, physical threats, and pressure from both corporate and conservative political elements in the United States after lead singer Natalie Maines publicly criticized then President of the United States George W. Bush during a live 2003 concert in London as part of their Top of the World Tour.</p>	
<p><u>Away From Her</u>: A 2006 Canadian independent drama film written and directed by Sarah Polley and starring Julie Christie and Gordon Pinsent. The film is based on Alice Munro's short story "The Bear Came Over the Mountain", from the 2001 collection <i>Hateship, Friendship, Courtship, Loveship, Marriage</i>. The story centers on a couple whose marriage is tested when the wife begins to develop Alzheimer's and moves into a nursing home, where she loses virtually all memory of her husband and begins to develop a close relationship with another nursing home resident. The film garnered critical acclaim, receiving Academy Awards nominations.</p>	

Chasing Coral: A 2017 American documentary film about a team of divers, scientists and photographers around the world who document the disappearance of coral reefs.



The Call to Courage: A 2019 documentary film directed by Sandra Restrepo. The documentary depicts Brené Brown as she discusses what it takes to choose courage over comfort in today's culture. The film is about how bravery can arise from engaging with our deepest vulnerabilities. Brené Brown has published TED Talks and books earlier about the subject, and this documentary continues exploring the topic.



Reflection Questions

Don't treat these questions like "homework" or try to answer everyone. Instead, make time to meditate on the list and then pick the one question that speaks to you most. The goal is to figure out which question captures the call of your inner voice? Which one contains "your work"? And what is that question trying to get you to notice or acknowledge?

Often it helps to read the list to a friend or loved one and ask them which question they think is the question you need to wrestle with!

1. What fears did your family of origin pass on to you?
2. What is the greatest act of courage that you directly witnessed? And how did it change you?
3. Has bravely not running away ever produced surprising results?
4. Are you being called to bravely not run away today?
5. What do you know now about courage that you didn't know when you were younger?
6. What seems more dangerous these days? Pessimism or optimism?
7. Is life calling you to make a "leap of faith"?
8. How would your life be enriched by bravely forgiving someone? Maybe even yourself?
9. What if Adrienne Maree Brown is right that joy and self-love are among today's most courageous acts of resistance?
10. In resistance to white supremacy culture, what are you courageous enough to stop normalizing? (sonyareneetaylor)
11. Is it time to tell someone how scared you really are?
12. Is safely tiptoeing around "it" making you ill?
13. Where are you saying "yes" when you need to courageously say "no"?
14. What if fear is an indicator of what you deep down long for and want to do?
15. Has comfort led you to forgetting what courage feels like?
16. Instead of standing up and speaking out, is courage now asking you to sit down and listen?
17. **What's your question?** Your question may not be listed above. As always, if the above questions don't include what life is asking from you, spend the month listening to your days to find it.
