

Movies

In & Of Itself: A new kind of lyric poem, storyteller and conceptual magician Derek DelGaudio fights to see through the illusion of his own identity, only to discover that identity itself is an illusion. An intimate and powerful exploration of what it means to be and be seen, the film chronicles Derek DelGaudio's attempt to answer one deceptively simple question, "Who am I?" His personal journey expands to a collective experience that forces us to confront the boundaries of our own identities.



<u>Gravity</u>: The film centers on Dr. Ryan Stone, a medical engineer on her first shuttle mission, and Matt Kowalsky, her commander, a veteran astronaut, helming his last flight before retirement. During a routine spacewalk, disaster strikes: The shuttle is destroyed, leaving Ryan and Matt stranded in deep space with no link to Earth and no hope of rescue. As fear turns to panic, they realize the only way home may be to venture further into space.



Pan's Labyrinth: An award-winning Spanish-Mexican dark fantasy film, the story takes place in Spain during the summer of 1944, five years after the Spanish Civil War, during the early Francoist period. Intertwining the real world with a mythical world, the film centers on an overgrown, abandoned labyrinth and a mysterious faun creature, with whom the main character, Ofelia, interacts. Ofelia's stepfather, the Falangist Captain Vidal, hunts the Spanish Maquis who fight against the Francoist, while Ofelia's pregnant mother Carmen grows increasingly ill. Ofelia meets several strange and magical creatures who become central to her story, leading her through the trials of the old labyrinth garden.



Free Solo: This film is a stunning, intimate, and unflinching portrait of free soloist climber Alex Honnold as he prepares to achieve his lifelong dream: climbing the face of the 3,000ft El Capitan in Yosemite National Park without a rope. Honnold's climb is celebrated as one of the greatest athletic feats of any kind and set the ultimate standard: perfection or death. Succeeding in this challenge, Honnold enters the annals of human achievement, exceeding our current understanding of human physical and mental potential, in a triumph of the human spirit.



My Octopus Teacher: A filmmaker forges an unusual friendship with an octopus living in a South African kelp forest, learning as the animal shares the mysteries of her world. This moving 2020 film won the Oscar for best documentary.

Reflection Questions

Don't treat these questions like "homework" or try to answer everyone. Instead, make time to meditate on the list and then pick <u>the one</u> question that speaks to you most. The goal is to figure out which question captures the call of your inner voice? Which one contains "your work"? And what is that question trying to get you to notice or acknowledge?

Often it helps to read the list to a friend or loved one and ask them which question they think is the question you need to wrestle with!

- 1. What was your first experience of wonder? Your first moment of awe?
- 2. What childhood book served as a doorway into wonder for you? How does its imprint on you remain?
- 3. Has age impeded or assisted your experience of wonder?
- 4. How has the location of wonder changed for you over time? Has it shifted from the stars to the woods? From the birth of planets to the birth of your child? From the physical feats your body allowed to the storied wrinkles of your hand?
- 5. At this stage of your life, do you prefer child-like wonder or adult-like wonder?
- 6. Is it possible to love someone without being in some way in awe of them?
- 7. Could it be that your challenge isn't noticing wonder, but savoring it? What strategy or habit might you take on to make sure wonder lingers?
- 8. If you were to list your top 10 values/priorities, where would "experiencing wonder" be on the list?
- 9. When was the last time you stood in wonder at your life partner?
- 10. Can you imagine someone standing in wonder at you?
- 11. If you were to make one change to your daily routine to let a bit more wonder in, what would it be?
- 12. They say the three main impediments to wonder are worry, accomplishment and judgment. When any of those three take center stage, wonder leaves the room. Is this in any way true for you?
- 13. What would make your holidays more wonder-filled?
- 14. What's your question? Your question may not be listed above. As always, if the above questions don't include what life is asking from you, spend the month listening to your days to find it.

"Do you remember what we learned this past summer?

Deep within the history of our universe, there have been galaxies dancing together. Stretching each other.

Did you see it? Did you see the pictures of NASA's Webb Telescope? We now know. No wait. We can now see: 5 galaxies. Let's stop there.

This week we saw images of five galaxies. I can't actually conceptualize that. But what I've learned is that four of those interact. They are pulling on one another. They are influencing each other.
